EDITORIAL

Dear reader, it is our pleasure to bring you this 132nd issue of *Revista Paranaense de Desenvolvimento*, that covers the period from January to June 2017. The original articles presented here tackle diverse forms of development.

Right in the first pages, we present you our *Agroindustrial Economics Dossier*, organized by PhD in Economics from the University of São Paulo, Professor Rodolfo Prates, in which the pillars of the Brazilian agroindustrial development are discussed without leaving aside concerns about economical, social and environmental sustainability.

In the following section, six articles extend the discussion on development by exploring themes related to creative economics, innovation, labor market, urban planning, public finance, and food safety.

In Innovation, Creative Economy and Development: an approximation for Metropolitan Porto Alegre from 2006 to 2013, Judith Sanson de Bem, Margarete Panerai Araujo and Moisés Waismann analyze the creative industry in metropolitan Porto Alegre, identifying characteristics that contribute to the local development. From the analysis of data on labor market, it turns out that creative industry has played a fundamental role in the dynamics, as it absorbs skilled labor and uses their creative potential to generate new cycles of innovation, thus contributing to development.

Rosélia Piquet, Érica Tavares and João Monteiro Pessoa investigate the changes in labor market in Rio de Janeiro that followed the transition from sugar industry to oil and gas exploration in Job Profile of the Sugar and Oil Sectors in Northern Rio de Janeiro State From 1970 to 2010.

In The Urban Mobility Plan and the Integrated Transport in Curitiba: an analysis of public accessibility policies, Marcus Vinicius Gonçalves da Silva, Amanda Cristina Pasqualini Peron, Antonio Gonçalves de Oliveira and Simone Aparecida Polli present a panoramic analysis of the Urban Mobility Plan of Curitiba and the local approach to accessibility.

In Efficiency of Public Expenditure on Health: an analysis of the performance of the Brazilian capital cities, Bruno Henrique S. Andrade, André Luiz M. Serrano, Rosangela Fátima S. Bastos e Vithor Rosa Franco quantify the efficiency of public health expenditures in the Brazilian capital cities, a low-efficiency scenario being identified in five of them. Better attention should be given to the management of public health resources.

In City Manager: a bibliometric analysis of the 1950-2016 period period, João Augusto W. Mischiatti, Anderson Catapan and Emerson Rogério Moleta discuss studies on the professionalization of municipal management, given the need to implement alternatives aimed at improving management efficiency.

In Food Security And Indigenous People: the Asheninka experience in the Upper Envira River with the Food Acquisition Program (FAP), Maria de Lourdes Lopes de Araujo and Rumi Regina Kubo present the implementation of a food acquisition program to an indigenous community in the State of Acre. Lastly, in Condescension: why does Brazil fail to grow as it should? Thiago de Sousa Barros presents us with his book review of Complacência: entenda por que o Brasil cresce menos do que pode, by Fabio Giambiagi e Alexandre Schwartsman. Have a good reading!
